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Mandate Letter to the Canon for Creation Care and Stewardship

Fifth Mark of Mission:

To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth

Dear Canon David Morgan,

Grace and peace in our Lord Jesus Christ!

I am writing with great joy and gratitude to officially invite you to take on the role of Canon for Creation Care and Stewardship, effective January 1, 2026, and continuing until January 1, 2029.

In this important position, you will also be a part of the Cathedral Chapter of St. John the Baptist Cathedral. Your passion for stewardship will inform our decision-making and support our shared mission. Your experience and dedication come at a crucial time as our Diocese reaffirms its commitment to caring for creation and promoting sustainability.

This appointment aligns with the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) and the fifth Mark of Mission: to care for creation and renew the earth. It reflects our biblical calling to be good stewards of God's creation (Genesis 1:28-31) and embodies our commitment to holistic mission. Your leadership will inspire a culture of environmental responsibility and stewardship throughout our Diocese.

As your bishop, I envision our Diocese continuing its journey with Set Sail, our strategic plan. We will focus on the Five Marks of Mission to guide our work together. Our goal is to promote stewardship that is relevant, culturally aware, and accessible to all, meeting people where they are in their relationship with creation as reflected in our Diocesan Mission Statement (listed below).

Canonical Mandate

In your role as Canon for Creation Care and Stewardship, you will be our primary strategist and advocate. You will help develop stewardship strategies, policies, and programs while fostering partnerships and guiding environmental reflection and action. Your insights will also

influence our governance, worship, and outreach efforts within the Cathedral Chapter and Diocese.

Together, we can address the pressing challenges of climate change. We could champion Diocesan efforts, such as energy-saving projects, community gardens, or other steps that help safeguard God's creation. We could also provide training sessions on creation care, so our clergy and lay leaders feel equipped to weave stewardship right into their everyday lives and work.

It is also important to ensure our approaches are inclusive, especially by collaborating with the Canon for Indigenous Ministry to create culturally sensitive programs. And by connecting with environmental partners and the heartfelt efforts already taking root in our own communities, we'll bring even more depth and grace to our common call to cherish the wondrous world God has given us.

To further strengthen your leadership and our shared mission, I encourage you to form a small team - a Creation Care and Stewardship Advisory Council. This group should reflect diverse voices within our Diocese, including clergy, laity, and environmental advocates. By convening this Council, we can build a collaborative spirit that keeps our stewardship efforts grounded in community wisdom and faithful action.

Place within the Cathedral Chapter

The Cathedral Chapter is a group of clergy and lay leaders who help govern and grow the mission of the Cathedral and Diocese. Your role as Canon for Creation Care and Stewardship will be a key part of our shared work.

To help us discern this together, please join our Cathedral Chapter meetings regularly, as scheduled. These meetings will be places for group wisdom, prayer, and thoughtful decisions.

I also look forward to one-on-one meetings with you at least twice a year. These will give us time for listening, reflection, and teamwork that respects your leadership. During these meetings, please share your ideas for a dedicated budget that would support your Canonical ministry. We will seek grants and funding based on your priorities for training, events, and partnerships.

If you ever need to step down from this role due to health, personal reasons, or any other reason, please discuss this with me openly and promptly, before submitting a formal resignation. This will allow us to discuss support options, plan next steps together, and ensure a smooth transition for the Diocese.

David, you are in my prayers, and you will be supported by the Chapter. You will be a partner in our mission. May our care for creation draw us closer, bringing Christ's Kingdom to life in our words and actions. With great respect and excitement for the path ahead, I remain,
