Mandate Letter to the Canon for Justice and Peace

Fourth Mark of Mission: to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind, and to pursue peace and reconciliation.

Dear Rev. Canon Amanda Taylor

Grace and peace in our Lord Jesus Christ!

I am writing with great joy and gratitude to officially invite you to take on the role of Canon for Justice and Peace, effective January 1, 2026, and continuing until January 1, 2029.

In this important position, you will also be a part of the Cathedral Chapter of St. John the Baptist. Your passion for justice and peace will inform our decision-making and support our shared mission. Your experience and dedication come at a crucial time as our Diocese reaffirms its commitment to transforming unfair social systems, challenging all forms of violence, and seeking peace and healing in God's world.

This appointment aligns with the Great Commission (Matthew 28:19-20) and the fourth Mark of Mission: *to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind, and to pursue peace and reconciliation*. Your ministry is rooted in the biblical mandate to "let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (Amos 5:24). It reflects the ministry of Jesus, who challenged unjust systems, embraced the marginalized, and called for peace.

As your bishop, I envision our Diocese continuing its journey with Set Sail, our strategic plan. We will focus on the Five Marks of Mission to guide our work together. Our goal is to promote ministry that is relevant, culturally aware, and accessible to all, meeting people where they are in their relationship with Christ as reflected in our Diocesan Mission Statement (listed below).

Canonical Mandate

In your role as Canon for Justice and Peace, you will be our primary strategist and advocate. You will equip the Diocese to authentically challenge injustices, while bridging the gap between the church and society. Your key responsibilities will include shaping strategies, policies, and programs that reflect your ministry; leading training for clergy and laity; fostering

partnerships beyond our walls; and guiding theological reflection on justice and peace. Your insights will also influence our governance, worship, and outreach efforts within the Cathedral Chapter and Diocese.

Together, we can address the pressing issues of injustice. We could champion Diocesan efforts, such as organizing parish workshops on restorative justice, equipping clergy and laity to lead community dialogues and tackling local inequalities. Additionally, collaborate with organizations to advocate for policy reforms, including protections for marginalized groups, and to coordinate advocacy efforts on issues such as racial equity, affordable housing, and climate justice. We could also provide training sessions, so our clergy and lay leaders feel equipped to weave justice and peace into their everyday lives and work.

It is also essential to ensure that our approaches are inclusive, especially by collaborating with the Canon for Truth, Reconciliation, and Right Relationships, to create culturally sensitive programs. We could lead a Diocesan initiative to engage with truth and reconciliation processes, such as those related to Indigenous communities or historical racial injustices.

To further strengthen your leadership and our shared mission, I encourage you to form a small team - a Justice and Peace Advisory Council. This group should reflect diverse voices within our Diocese, including clergy, laity, and advocates. By convening this Council, we can build a collaborative spirit that keeps our justice and peace efforts grounded in community wisdom and faithful action.

Place within the Cathedral Chapter

The Cathedral Chapter is a group of clergy and lay leaders who help govern and grow the mission of the Cathedral and Diocese. Your role as Canon for Justice and Peace will be a key part of our shared work. To help us discern this together, please join our Cathedral Chapter meetings regularly, as scheduled. These meetings will be places for group wisdom, prayer, and thoughtful decisions.

I also look forward to one-on-one meetings with you at least twice a year. These will give us time for listening, reflection, and teamwork that respects your leadership. During these meetings, please share your ideas for a dedicated budget that would support your Canonical ministry. We will seek grants and funding based on your priorities for training, events, and partnerships.

If you ever need to step down from this role due to health, personal reasons, or any other reason, please discuss this with me openly and promptly, before submitting a formal resignation. This will allow us to discuss support options, plan next steps together, and ensure a smooth transition for the Diocese.

Amanda, you are in my prayers, and you will be supported by the Chapter. May our care for justice and peace draw us closer, bringing Christ's Kingdom to life in our words and actions. With great respect and excitement for the path ahead, I remain,
